

Essay Rubric: Pros and Cons of U.S. Immigration Policy

Content Knowledge	Demonstrates comprehensive understanding of both pros and cons of U.S. immigration policy. Persuasiveness	Arguments are compelling and effectively persuade the reader to consider both sides of the issue. Demonstrates ability to present arguments persuasively with well-supported claims.	Arguments are clear and attempt to persuade the reader to consider both sides of the issue. Claims are mostly supported with evidence.	Arguments are stated but lack persuasiveness. Conclusion	Conclusion effectively summarizes key points discussed in the essay and provides a thoughtful reflection on the topic.	Conclusion summarizes key points but may lack a clear connection to the rest of the essay or offer a minimal reflection on the topic.	Conclusion is vague or does not effectively summarize key points discussed in the essay.	No conclusion is provided or conclusion is completely unrelated to the rest of the essay.
