


Explanation: You can vote before, during and after going to jail/prison. Your opportunity to vote is never taken away.

What does this option want a person that committed a felony to do in order to get the opportunity to vote again? Why do you think society would want this?




Explanation: You only lose your opportunity to vote if you are currently in jail/prison for a felony conviction, an election crime, or treason. Probation and parole do not restrict your opportunity to vote.

Reasons For This Option:	Reasons Against This Option:
-Opportunity to participate in government is limited while serving your time for breaking the law	-Doesn't prove that you will be a law abiding citizen when released
-Temporary consequences for your actions but the opportunity will be restored	-Takes away the opportunity to vote

What does this option want a person that committed a felony to do in order to get the opportunity to vote again? Why do you think society would want this?




Explanation: You lose the opportunity to vote if you are convicted of a felony. Your opportunity to vote is automatically restored two years after you complete your sentence, including time in jail/prison, parole, or probation.

Reasons For This Option:	Reasons Against This Option:
-Opportunity to participate in government is limited while serving your time for breaking the law	-The severity of the felony committed doesn't impact opportunity to vote
-Given time outside of jail/prison to prove that you can follow the laws in society before being given the opportunity to vote again	-Takes away the opportunity to vote

What does this option want a person that committed a felony to do in order to get the opportunity to vote again? Why do you think society would want this?




Explanation: Your opportunity to vote is taken away and will be restored after completing the entire sentence, including time in jail/prison, parole and/or probation, and payment of all fines. Unless you were convicted of murder or a sexual offense then you have to petition the governor to restore your opportunity to vote.

Reasons For This Option:	Reasons Against This Option:
-The governor decides if someone who committed murder or a sexual offense can have the opportunity to vote again	-Takes away the chance to vote
-Requires people who didn't commit murder or a sexual offense to serve their time and pay off debts before given the opportunity to vote	-Those who commit murder and sexual offense could lose the chance to vote permanently depending on the decision of the governor
