

## SALON DESSERT

### Teacher Instructions:

1. **GROUP:** One person from each group will meet with a member from each of the other groups.
2. **SHARE/QUESTION:** Each student will share their philosopher's perspectives, answering the two questions, followed by questions from the other students. This is to be repeated until all students have shared their philosopher's point of view.
3. **OPEN DISCUSSION:**
  - a. Students can ask questions
  - b. Share their personal opinions.
4. **VOTE:** Vote on guilt or innocence
5. **VOTE:** Vote on the justice of this case

### Student Discussion Prompts:

*(if needed)*

1. How would legal counsel for the accused change this case?
2. If Eloise is convicted of this crime, what does it say about our society?
3. If Eloise is acquitted of this crime, what does it say about our society?
4. What questions would Eloise have if she were sitting here with you?
5. What is the most important piece of evidence?
6. How does fear or emotion affect the way people interpret physical evidence?
7. What aspects of this trial do you think are fair?
8. What aspects of this trial do you think are unfair?
9. What advice might Eloise offer to other women in a similar situation to her own?
10. What's different about how this murder trial was conducted as compared to the US's murder trials today?
11. If you were on a jury, would you say there is enough clear evidence to prove Éloïse is guilty beyond a reasonable doubt? What else would you want to know?
